

Royal Cars at Sandringham

In May 2007, we were fortunate to visit the museum containing the collection of cars belonging to the Royal Family in the grounds of beautiful Sandringham House in Norfolk. The museum houses a collection of around a dozen or so vehicles including some wonderful model cars used by Royal children in recent years. Amongst the cars on display, were the following:

Daimler 4 litre saloon – early in 1947, Queen Mary, then nearly 80 years old, ordered her last Daimler. Her favourite colour of green was used for the paintwork as she intended it for use on private occasions and wanted to avoid the attention which a car in the Royal livery of black or maroon would receive outside a gallery or shop. Therefore, the Queen referred to the car as "the shopping Daimler". The design was amended at Queen Mary's request as she felt the driver's compartment to be too wide and it was therefore reduced with a special dashboard and front wings. The Queen was delighted with the new car and it was used almost every day until her death in 1953.

Citroen Daimler – built in the late 1920s/early 1930s and used by the Queen and Princess Margaret when children. An electric car and one of reproductions of the Citroen C4 made by Andre Citroen for his son Miki in 1928, a limited number of which were put on the market. Power is supplied by two 12 volt batteries with a top speed of 8 mph. The car was renovated and also used by Prince Charles.

Rolls Royce Phantom V (1961) – this vehicle was in regular use for state and official occasions until its replacement in 2002. When the Queen used the vehicle, her personal silver mascot of St George and the Dragon was placed on the bonnet in the place of the usual *Spirit of Ecstasy*. The shield displaying the Royal Arms and the Royal Standard flagpole can be fixed and taken down from the roof by the chauffeur whilst on the move. The removable rear roof section exposed an inner perspex lining that gave spectators a clearer view of the Royal passengers. As one of two Rolls Royces kept at the Royal Mews, this car enjoyed a busy working life including being transported to Russia for a state visit by the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh in 1994. The shield fitted above the windscreen is replaced at night by the Blue Lamp to signify a member of the Royal Family is being carried.

Daimler Double-Six 30 Brougham – this car was purchased by King George V for his personal use in 1929. Among its many special features are the polished mahogany interior with fittings of silver and ivory and the rear compartment trimmed with blue leather.

Daimler V-4.5 litre Shooting Brake – in May 1937, a new Daimler shooting brake was ordered for delivery before King George VI's visit to Balmoral later that summer. Like the new Daimler state car acquired just before the Coronation, it had a 4.5 litre engine that provided 32 bhps. The shooting brake is finished in natural woods and accommodates up to ten people. There is a folding luncheon table down the centre and specially fitted gun racks. Glass windows of the drop type afford good visibility and ample ventilation in hot weather.

1924 57 bhp Daimler Shooting Brake – this six-cylinder shooting brake was the first of four new vehicles commissioned from Hooper & Co (Coachbuilders) of Piccadilly for the personal use of King George V and delivered in 1924. The exterior is finished in varnished wood with the scuttle and bonnet grained and varnished to match. The brown leather interior accommodated up to eight people with a rack for up to 12 guns with the Royal Crest on the back and side panels.

1951 Ford V8 Pilot Shooting Brake – known as the "Woody" shooting brake and the last new car owned by King George VI, having been ordered in 1951. Several modifications were made in particular the gear lever on the steering column being replaced with a floor change in accordance with His Majesty's preferences. Sadly, the King died in 1952 before he could really enjoy his new Pilot but the Royal Family kept the car for sentimental reasons and it remained in use until the 1960s.

Armstrong Siddeley 30 hp Shooting Brake – commissioned for the Duke of York, later King George VI, in 1928 and delivered in January 1929. It was taken up to the Duke and Duchess's Scottish home, Birkhall on the Balmoral estate where it was used for three years. It is still in working order and has been in almost constant use on grouse moors in Scotland and Yorkshire.

1968 MGC GT – used extensively by Prince Charles under the registration number SGY 776F until it was returned, originally to Windsor and finally to Sandringham.

1961 Alvis TD 21 Drophead Coupé – this car was specially built for HRH The Duke of Edinburgh to his specifications with a taller screen and higher roof line and electric folding hood. The standard walnut veneer fascia has been replaced with leather.

1956 Ford Zephyr Estate – this was used extensively at Sandringham and the first modern estate car to be acquired by the Royal Family. Based on the contemporary Zephyr saloon, the car is fitted with a specially designed "Woody" estate body. This unique vehicle was at one time in almost constant use carrying passengers and their luggage about the Sandringham estate with room for up to nine passengers. In the past few years, the car has undergone a complete refurbishment by students at Manchester College of Arts & Technology.

The Queen Mother's Racing Buggy – this converted golf buggy was first used in the late 1990s to assist Her Majesty's progress at her many public appearances at events and race meetings all over Britain. By the time of Her Majesty's 100th birthday in 2000, it was well known. The buggy allowed many more people to meet the Queen Mother at the Sandringham Flower Show and outside Sandringham Church after morning service. It is painted in the Queen Mother's racing colours – buff and pale blue.

1914 Daimler – delivered to His Majesty King George V in December 1914, it is a 45 hp Daimler Brougham. It has a remarkably spacious interior and large windows fitted into frames with a "special device" which allowed them to be opened to any height without rattling. However, the chauffeur did not have an enclosed driver's compartment and his only protection was a leather curtain on a spring roller which extended from the front of the passenger compartment to the top of the windscreen. The seat was made of buffalo hide and the car originally had leather mudguards.

All the "official" vehicles used by the Royal Family, past and present, have a high roof line which enables them to sit in and alight from the vehicles without removing their head-dress. This practice dates back to the early 1900s when His Majesty and distinguished guests would quite often wear a Field Marshal's hat and plumes at official engagements and the ladies' fashion of that period was one of high feathered hats.

It is interesting to note that state cars are the only vehicles that are not required to display registration plates. There are five state cars kept at the Royal Mews, London and the colour of Royal limousines – Royal Claret over Black – was adopted by Queen Victoria.

The Sandringham estate and wonderful gardens are well worth a visit if you are in the Norfolk area; the collection of cars on display is an added bonus to your trip!
