Well, we got back from holiday after an excellent time (1,600 miles). Briefly, I've learnt that the Brede Engine Run was well supported and was an excellent evening.



In September, Hooe's Old Motor Club entered a team in the annual inter-Motor Clubs Quiz Night held at Langney Sports Centre - an event which was also attended by Eastbourne RAM Club, A30/A35 Club and the Triumph Club. Hooe Club was



represented by Elsa, Chris and Judy and Gerry and Julie and supported quietly in the background by Ron Shubb. In spite of this, Hooe scored a resounding victory, winning several points ahead of all the other teams!

St Pancras - Euro style by Alan Hodges

The chance to look at this latest reincarnation of rail travel was to good to miss when a friend pointed out to me that a local coach firm were offering a trip to St Pancras for only £8.50. The trip certainly was very popular with two coaches making the trip to North London. I can't remember the last time I travelled through London and was able to sit back and view the many landmarks old and new. To me the Blackwall tunnel is always like a gateway into London and its Victorian architecture never fails to fascinate Built in 1897, this tunnel originally cost £1.4M. Doesn't sound much now, but a heck of a lot of money then! Once through the tunnel, our route takes us along the banks of the Thames with views of Canary Wharf, London Eye, the O2 (wasn't that the Millennium Dome several billion pounds of Taxpayers money ago?), the Tower of London, St Paul's, and We also passed the Docklands Light Railway, and I was HMS Belfast. reminded that this Railway is driverless, i.e. it is operated and managed on a remote basis, amazing. It was good to see that the old GPO Mount Pleasant sorting office still survives, despite the best efforts of the powers that be to reduce our postal service to a shambles, or have they achieved that objective already??

On arrival at St Pancras, one can't fail to be impressed by the way that the new structure has been blended with the old. The original Station was opened in 1868, under the Midland Railway management of William Barlow and for many years held the proud boast of being the largest enclosed space in the world. The roof is 689 feet long, spans 243 feet, is 100 feet high, and boasts 14,080 pieces of glass. Much of the brickwork is original and has been recycled. One of the focal points of this magnificent piece of architecture is the beautiful replica Dent clock, the story goes that when the original clock was taken down during the reconstruction of the station the Clock was damaged beyond repair. True or myth??, perhaps it is true, or at least I haven't seen it for sale on Ebay!! The front of the Station on Euston Road, still retains the old Gothic charm of the Midland Great Hotel which closed in 1935 when it became offices for the Midland Railway, and was renamed St Pancras Chambers. Work is afoot to convert the building into a five star Marriot Hotel, with the addition of luxury private apartments. In 1966, there were plans as part of the rejuvenation of the Kings Cross area to merge Kings Cross and St Pancras Stations. of the chief opponents of this plan was Sir John Betjeman the Poet Laureate, and in 1967 the Station was granted a grade 1 listing and thus

was safe from the greedy developer. A statue of the great man (Betjeman that is, not the greedy developer!!) can be seen on the main concourse of St Pancras Station. A particular feature of this new development, is the long shopping arcade on the ground level below the Station, which when completed will be superb, well okay it's only shops so don't lets get too carried away!!

The developers have certainly succeeded in creating an international ambience, with the addition also of a wide variety of eateries. At platform level, St Pancras boasts the longest Champagne bar in Europe, 90 metres long and where for a minimum of £7.50, one can enjoy a glass of bubbly. A quick trip next door to visit Kings Cross Station provides an interesting comparison between the two cultures of travel 21st century style, with Kings Cross seeming like the remnants of a long lost age, and certainly needing a good facelift of its own.

Paris in two and a quarter hours? What would the early Railway pioneers like Stephenson, Brunel, etc have thought, and not behind a Steam Locomotive either. The invention of the Railway certainly created new horizons in Britain in the nineteenth century, but who then would have envisaged travelling in a train through a tunnel under the English Channel to Europe.

The club has applied for membership of the FEDERATION OF BRITISH HISTORIC VEHICLE CLUBS after putting it to the membership at the meeting on the 5th of September. The Federation of British Historic Vehicle Clubs is a grouping of over 450 Clubs and Museums together with some 1500 Trade and Individual Supporters.



The aim of the Federation is to uphold the freedom to use old vehicles on the roads without any undue restriction and to support its member organisations in whatever way it can.

FBHVC actively seeks information about legislative proposals that are likely to have an impact on the historic vehicle community. When necessary it campaigns to influence the decision making process to remove, or at least minimise, any adverse results

Details of legislation that is currently receiving attention are reported in the bi-monthly newsletter that is sent to subscribers and any information or updates of current legislation will be advised to Hooe club members via the club newsletter.
