

Discontinuance of the Tax Disc in October 2014

The proposal says the existing VED licence (even if it is for a Historic Vehicle and no actual VED is payable) will expire when the Secretary of State is notified of the change of keeper (i.e. when DVLA receives the V5C in Swansea). Neither buyer nor seller will know exactly when that is.

But the seller, because of Continuous Insurance, will need to keep his insurance in place until he is sure the licence has lapsed. The buyer will presumably not be able to get a new licence until the old one has lapsed but will need to have put insurance in place to use the vehicle after sale.

Perhaps worse, on a vehicle in respect of which VED is payable, although the seller will be able to claim a rebate on any existing VED, he will not get refund of that part of the month's VED in which the sale occurs. Meanwhile the buyer will immediately have to apply for a licence. This seems to have the effect that some VED will be paid twice over. This looks wrong in principle.

Federation Adopts 'SelectaDNA' as Approved Vehicle Security System

Following tests and desk research the Federation of British Historic Vehicle Clubs has endorsed its first vehicle security device. At its heart, 'SelectaDNA' uses traceability and deterrence as its weapons against car thieves.

Each SelectaDNA kit is unique to the vehicle to which it is applied, can be applied by even the most inexperienced home mechanic, and in only a matter of minutes your cherished historic vehicle and its component parts will carry a unique DNA code for life.

This DNA code is held on a central database to which all UK Police forces have access. These forces can identify the presence of SelectaDNA on a vehicle by simply exposing it, or components from it, to ultra violet light. Having established by this means that SelectaDNA is fitted there are two ways the stolen property can be traced to the owner. The kit includes a small pot of colourless fluid into which is suspended tiny microdots. These microdots carry the DNA code and can be quickly read by the police. If for some reason a microdot is not present, the fluid itself carries the code which can be retrieved under forensic analysis.

How the Morris Minor got its shape

When shown the prototype of the Morris Minor, Lord Nuffield said "[The car] looks like a bloody poached egg."

The prototype of the Morris Minor, known as the Morris Mosquito, was 4 in narrower than the eventual production model and its dimensions, when compared to those of the Morris Minor and the Austin A30/A35, are as follows

	Length	width	height	track
Production Morris Minor	148"	60"	60"	50"
Morris Mosquito	148"	56"	60"	46"
Austin A30/A35	136"	55"	58"	45"

It will be noted that the dimensions of the Mosquito's width and track are similar to those of the Austin A30/A35, but that the Mosquito is 12" longer and 2" higher than the Austin A30/A35. Consequently, the Mosquito must have looked rather long and narrow, as well as being a little top heavy, so maybe this is why Lord Nuffield thought that the vehicle looked like a 'poached egg'.

To quote from 'The Morris Motor Car' by Harry Edwards: 'It was while the tooling for the body dies were underway, and some actually completed, that Alec Issigonis decided that for aesthetic reasons he would increase the width of the body by a few inches. To get the proportions right he had a pre-production model cut in half longwise and the two halves moved apart until he felt the proportions were right. The increase decided upon was 4in and, as a result, the width dimension increased from 56" to 60". There remains a legacy of this change of mind on subsequent production cars, for the bumpers, designed for the original narrow body, had already been produced by Wilmot Breedon. Rather than scrap them, they were cut in half and a steel spacing piece added. Another feature to be found on the eventual production bodies, bearing witness to this last minute change of mind, is the raised 4in wide centre section on the bonnet".

If Lord Nuffield had not made his 'poached egg' remark about the Mosquito, perhaps its designer would not have been prompted to increase the width of the vehicle by 4in, thereby creating a spacious, stable and well proportioned model which still has many admirers today....

I DEMAND THAT YOU CHANGE YOUR COURSE 15 DEGREES NORTH, OR COUNTER MEASURES WILL BE UNDERTAKEN TO ENSURE THE SAFETY OF THIS SHIP.
